
Understanding Fisheries Governance

- Governance process, rules, regulations, and institutions involved in governing fisheries
- Ineffective or failed governance leads to crisis and conflict
- Governance is multilayered
- Involves multiple actors
- Involves power, group interests (financial), politics, etc.
- By analyzing governance "landscape" we can reveal and address faults and inefficiencies

Typical issues

- Top-down
- Uninformed or biased
- Not adaptive
- Lacking feedback mechanisms and exclusion of local voices
- Uneven power and resources among stakeholders
- Driven by outside agendas


